



APPLICATION PROCESS

All applicants should become familiar with the process outlined here. Candidates who are Year 12 ATAR students in Western Australia **do not need to apply to TISC**; they should instead apply direct to WAAPA though ECU's applicant portal.





If you are successful at audition and meet ECU requirements:

If you are successful at your audition/interview, **and** you meet ECU's academic and/or English entry requirements, and there are places available, then an official offer will be made via email.

Please note: Successful applicants who meet ECU entry requirements will receive notification of their offer from December onwards.

If you are successful at audition, but do NOT meet ECU requirements:

If you are successful at audition/interview, **but you do not meet** ECU's academic and/or English entry requirements, you will not be made an offer and will be advised of this outcome via email.

In some courses, you may be advised that there is no place for you now, but you have been placed on a reserve list.

This means that your application was not successful, but, if a place becomes available in future, you will be contacted to see if you are still interested in the course and wish to reopen your application.

Please note: If your preferences change once you receive audition outcomes, you should contact ECU and <u>request to change your preferences</u>.

VIDEO AUDITION ADVICE

JAZZ (Instrumental, Vocal and Drum/Percussion)

It is only necessary to submit a video audition if you are unable to attend a live audition. (See next page for live audition information.)

AUDITION APPLICATION (Acceptd)

Please submit a recording of your prepared piece/s via Acceptd as outlined in this audition guide. In addition to the prepared piece, please upload a video recording demonstrating your knowledge of the scales and arpeggios in this document. Each scale and arpeggio may be performed once in your own preferred key, tempo and range (number of octaves) appropriate to your instrument. When considering tempi, choose a tempo that demonstrates accuracy but also fluency and technical command.

For **drummer/percussion** video auditions, please upload a video demonstrating all sections except (2) Chart Reading and Interpretation on page 5.

Location

• Make sure the room that you film in is well lit and quiet.

Camera Angle and Positioning

• Ensure that you are appropriately positioned and distanced from the camera for filming, so that your face and the instrument you are playing are in frame, and so that the panellists can clearly see you perform. Vocalists should ensure that their full body is in frame.

Sound Quality

• It is really important that panellists can clearly hear your instrument and/or voice. If possible, use a remote microphone to showcase your performance in high quality.

Introduction

 In your video include an introduction of up to two minutes in length. Tell us a little bit about yourself and your musical background and why you want to study at WAAPA. This does not have to be in too much detail – we are just looking to get to know a bit about you.

Follow Up

• Once your video audition has been assessed, we may contact you to arrange a theory test. More information will be sent to you if the test is required.

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Applications made after 11 November *may* be considered at the panel's discretion. There is no guarantee that such late applications will be considered.

AUDITION/INTERVIEW

Applicants will need to prepare for a live audition and interview in Perth, which will last around 20 minutes in total. Please arrive 15 minutes before your appointment time. Practice rooms will be available for warming up. After performing your chosen piece(s), the audition panel will interview you to ask about your goals for the future, and about your musical background and experiences. The panel will also be happy to answer your questions regarding course content, performance opportunities, ensemble activities, principal study teachers, career options, and so on.

Please note, your audition may be filmed and/or recorded for panel review and assessment purposes. If you do not wish for this to happen, please advise your panel before the commencement of your audition.

Instrumentalists or voice applicants may bring a backing track on a personal device (e.g. phone or laptop), or use accompanists (e.g. a pianist and double bassist). Please note that your audition time does not allow for the setting up of individual backing groups.

THE AUDITION PROCESS (Instrumentalists and Vocalists)

- **Prepared Pieces:** Perform one piece of music of your choice (vocalists will be expected to perform two contrasting tunes), demonstrating your technical skills and interpretive abilities.
- We often get asked questions related to tune or song choice. 'Jazz' is now a very broad genre, and incorporates different styles and genres. Examples of prepared pieces for Jazz applicants have typically include any 'jazz standard' or 'jazz instrumental' that can demonstrate your technical facility, interpretive and improvising ability. A 'jazz standard' is typically a 32-bar song form such as Autumn Leaves (Kosma/ Mercer), I Got Rhythm (Gershwin) or Take the A-Train (Strayhorn). A 'jazz instrumental' is typically a composition written by a jazz performer such as Blue Bossa (Kenny Dorham), St. Thomas (Sonny Rollins) or Ornithology (Charlie Parker). However, you can also choose a piece more aligned with 'jazz fusion' or groove-based styles. Improvisation within your prepared piece is encouraged. There are many pieces you could choose from, and guidance from a dedicated jazz instrumental or vocal tutor is highly recommended. You should aim to play something you enjoy, where you can perform comfortably and confidently.

AUDITION (continued)

- Improvisation: Improvise over a jazz 12 bar blues pattern. This will be to a backing tack (rhythm section). A typical jazz blues chord progression as a reference for this style is *Billie's Bounce* (Parker) or *Straight No Chaser* (T.Monk). Outlining each chord in the progression within your improvisation is encouraged.
- **Call and Response:** Play back on your instrument (sing if you're a vocalist) 5 recorded musical examples of 2 bar duration.
- **Sight Reading:** You will be asked to sight-read various musical examples.
- Scales and Arpeggios: You may be asked to demonstrate knowledge of the following scales (in any key) – major scales, mixolydian modes, Aeolian modes, jazz minor scales (ascending melodic minor), major pentatonic, minor pentatonic, dorian modes and blues scales. Additionally, you may be asked to demonstrate knowledge of the following arpeggios in any key: major, minor and dominant 7th.

Jazz vocalists need only demonstrate knowledge of major scale, natural minor (Aeolian mode), major pentatonic and minor pentatonic in their preferred key. Similarly, they need only demonstrate the above arpeggios in their preferred key.

Examples of these scales are shown on the next page. For further examples, the Music department recommends Scales for Jazz Improvising by Dan Hearle (Studio PR. USA).

THE AUDITION PROCESS

(Drummers and Percussionists)

There are 5 audition components for drummers and percussionists:

1. Drum Rudiment	S
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a) Single Stroke (32nds)	=80
b) Triple Stroke Roll (Fr. Roll)	=94
c) Double Stroke (Open Roll)	=100
d) Five Stroke Roll	=110
e) Seven Stroke Roll	
(double pulse)	=100
(triple pulse)	=75
f) Nine Stroke Roll (32nds)	=100
g) Single Paradiddle	=155
h) Double paradiddle 6/8	=99
i) Flam	=250
j) Flam Tap	=104
k) Flamaque	=110
l) Flam Paradiddle	=100
m) Single Drag Tap	=140
n) Double Drag Tap 6/8	=70
o) Single Ratamacue	=90
p) Double Ratamacue	=58
q) Triple Ratamacue 4/4	=90

- 2. Chart Reading and Interpretation.
- 3. Demonstration of Contemporary Drum-set Styles: applicants will be expected to demonstrate knowledge of rock, funk, fusion, Latin and jazz.

- 4. Mallet Keyboard Knowledge (if applicable).
- 5. Written Drum Solo: select and perform a written solo. Examples of selections are any one from examples 1-10 from *The All American Drummer: 150 Rudimentary Solos* (Charlie Wilcoxon), an excerpt with play-along from *The Art of Bop Drumming* (John Riley), or any transcribed jazz drum solo, no longer than 32 bars.

Theory Test:

All live auditionees must complete a written theory and aural test, usually held on the day of your audition. This test is diagnostic only, and you are not necessarily required to pass this test to be accepted into a course. Should you be accepted into a course, this information will help us know how to best direct you through your studies.
